

Dear citizens

This is my last communication with you as Mayor of Ogden - my mandate expires with the election in November and I am not running for re-election. These past four years have been an invaluable learning experience for me, and I want to share with you the most precious and significant kernels of wisdom and intelligence I have been privileged to absorb.

As you know, I have always believed that progress happens only to the extent that we get involved in our community -- that each



My colleagues have been essential to the successful implementation of many programs. We improved roads immensely, made our garbage collection more efficient and less costly. We adopted by-laws for the welfare of our animals. We greatly improved communications with the citizens through our new bi-monthly Chronicles bulletin. We were able to work with the MRC experts to help us resolve issues with their extensive knowledge and savoirfaire. We modified the speed limits to protect our citizens. We commissioned the creation of an historic booklet. We ended each year with a comfortable surplus in case of major disaster. These successes are vital to improving our day to day lives.

The major change this administration has achieved is a fundamental one that illustrates the benefit of having women involved in policy decisions and actions – changing from a budget-only orientation to an administration focused on the individual. Opening up the municipality to citizens through our social committee has created many opportunities for citizens to meet and to discuss issues directly with council and the mayor. Activities such as Meet the Mayor (with around 60-70 citizens participating) and Sugaring-off parties (around 100 citizens participating) made a huge difference in citizens getting to know the people they elected.

One main objective was to make the municipality more dynamic. Our social committee offered activities that stimulate and help condition mind and body – Pilates, Tai Chi, line dancing, art initiation, Zumba etc. Not only did our citizens meet and exchange views, but they also committed to a healthier, more vibrant community.

Ogden has two distinct populations – the lake citizens and the farming community – who have completely different ways of thinking and living. We feel we helped in starting to build a bridge between these two distinct communities. Now with many new citizens from the major cities moving here, things will change even more and we must adapt.

Women have told me that they do not seek election as a power trip or simply to exercise authority but more to combine their knowledge and sensitivity to create relational and motivational long-term changes. I am convinced that the considerable skills both men and women bring to council will achieve this worthy goal. Thank you so much for the opportunity you gave me these last four years.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

VOTING BY MAIL

You can vote by mail if you are in one of the following situations:

- Your domicile is not located in the territory of the municipality;
- Your domicile is located in the territory of the municipality and;
 - You are domiciled in an eligible health establishment.
 - You are unable to travel for health reasons or you are a caregiver domiciled at the same address as such a person;
 - You will be 70 years of age or older on polling day.
 - Between Sunday, October 17, 2021, and Wednesday, October 27, 2021, you must comply with an order or a recommendation for isolation from public health authorities because you:
- returned from a trip abroad within the last 14 days;
- were diagnosed with COVID-19 and you are still considered a carrier of the disease;
- are showing COVID-19 symptoms;
- have been in contact with a suspected, probable or confirmed case of COVID-19 within the last 14 days;
- are waiting for a COVID-19 test result.

To vote by mail, you must make an application by contacting the returning officer, Vickie Comeau, no later than Wednesday, October 27, 2021.

How you apply and the validity of your application will vary depending on your situation:

- If your domicile is not in the municipality, your application must be made in writing and will be kept for all elections and referendums following its receipt.
- If you are domiciled in the municipality and you must comply with an order or recommendation for isolation from public health authorities, your application may be verbal or written and will be valid for the current poll only.
- If you are in one of the above-listed situations, your application may be verbal or written and will be valid for the current poll and any recommenced proceedings arising from this poll.

The ballot papers for voting by mail will be sent as of October 13th, 2021.

If you are registered to vote by mail and you have not received your ballot papers a few days after their sending, you can contact the returning officer to obtain new ones.

Ballot papers must be received at the office of the returning officer no later than Friday, November 5, 2021, at 4:30 p.m.

¹ Eligible health establishment are hospital centres, CHSLDs, rehabilitation centres and private seniors' residences listed in the register established under the Act respecting health services and social services (chapter S-4.2) and hospital centres or reception centres within the meaning of the Act respecting health services and social services for Cree Native persons (chapter S-5).

HIGH SPEED INTERNET

Here is the latest information received from the office of the Premier of Quebec:

On March 22, 2021, the governments of Quebec and Canada launched Operation High Speed. The Régions branchées and Éclair I components target 148,000 households, for a joint investment of \$826.3 million. The Éclair II component, launched on July 21, targets an additional 18,200 new homes, in addition to accelerating the rollout to 34,500 homes covered by previous rounds of funding, for an investment of \$94 million. All projects funded by Operation High Speed must be completed by September 2022.

The company selected to cover the municipalities of the Memphremagog RCM is Cogeco: Canada-Quebec High-Speed Operation - Governments of Canada and Quebec add \$94M to connect 18,200 additional homes to high-speed Internet by September 2022: Government of Quebec (quebec.ca)

Over the past few weeks, Cogeco has been conducting an inventory of homes without high-speed Internet access (HSI). The High-Speed Internet Secretariat of the Ministère du Conseil exécutif is currently analyzing and validating this inventory to ensure that no eligible residence is missed. In the meantime, Cogeco is finalizing the project engineering and permit applications to access the support infrastructure (poles and strands). Only once these steps are completed will Cogeco be able to plan the construction work, and therefore confirm the work schedule for our municipality. It is important to note that all accessible year-round residences with a Hydro Quebec meter are eligible for Operation High Speed. Unlike previous programs, there is no "list of addresses and routes» since the entire territory is covered.

Remember that the minimum speed offered must be 50 Mps for downloading and 10 Mbps for uploading. In addition, the price of the packages will have to be similar to those offered in the major cities.

An interactive map will be available at the beginning of 2022 on the Quebec government's website, to allow citizens to obtain more details on the projects financed by Operation High Speed and their progress.

REMINDER - RACCOON RABIES: REPORT SUSPICIOUS ANIMALS

The best way to prevent a return of raccoon rabies in Quebec is through surveillance.

Did you know that reporting wildlife can be done yearround? You can report any raccoon, skunk or fox found dead or that appears sick, paralyzed, disoriented or unusually aggressive.



SAFETY WHILE WALKING AT NIGHT

It is a good idea when walking, especially at dawn, dusk, and other low-light conditions, to wear light colors or bright clothing so that you can be easily seen. Dress to be seen by drivers. If you walk at night, remember that wearing white clothing does not guarantee drivers can see you. When walking at night, use a flashlight to make yourself more visible to drivers and to help light your path. It is also a good idea to wear reflective or retroreflective materials, which give off light when headlights shine on them and can be seen by drivers three times farther than white. Many stores sell walking shoes, jackets, and safety sports equipment featuring retroreflective material. Be safe!

| Public Notice of Election | September 17, 2021 at the latest |
| Last day for property owners and residents to transmit their signed request to the municipality in order to be registered on the electoral list before it is submitted | October 3, 2021 |
| Last day for co-owners and co-occupants to transmit their procurations to the municipality in order to designate a person to be registered on the electoral list before it is submitted | October 3, 2021 |
| Period for submitting candidacy declarations | September 17 to October 1, 2021 (closes at 4:30 pm) |
| Period for submitting a request for revision of electoral list | Potential period: October 16-26, 2021 |
| Revision of electoral list, if necessary | Potential period:October 16-28, 2021 |
| First day to request to vote by correspondance for electors recommended to isolate or as ordered by public health officials | October 17, 2021 |
| Last day for receiving requests to vote by correspondance at the office of the president of elections | October 27, 2021 |
| Last day to send vote ballots by correspondance to electors | October 28, 2021 |
| Date limit for receiving correspondance vote ballots addressed to the president of elections | November 5, 2021, 4:30 pm |
| Manditory anticipated voting day | October 31, 2021, 9:30 am to 8:00 pm |
| Election day | November 7, 2021, from 9:30 am to 8:00 pm |
| Last day to request a recount or a new vote census at the Cour du Québec | 4 days following the vote count, which generally means November 11, 2021 |
| Proclamation of elected officials | For those elected without opposition: October 1, 2021, at 4:30 pm For those elected by ballot: followed the delay established for requesting a recount or a new vote census at the <i>Cour du Québec</i> , which generally falls on November 12, 2021. |
| Last day for legal contest of elections | 30 days after the election proclamation |
